??? History Question ???

April History Question: April's question centered around Louis Auguste & Sarah Elizabeth Wilson Benoist's oldest son Henry Augustus Benoist (b. 1851) and his wife Mary Ellen (Carton) Benoist (b. ???). In what years did they die?

Answer: Henry Augustus Benoist died in 1923; we were unable to find a death date for Mary Ellen (Carton) Benoist.

History Question for July - Background: In the 1830's, Louis A. Benoist engaged regularly in the banking business. By 1838 his financial operations had developed to such an extent that he established a branch banking house in New Orleans which was conducted first under the name of Benoist & Hankney, and later under the name of Benoist, Shaw & Co. The St. Louis parent house, along with the New Orleans branch, became one of the leading financial institutions of the south. It did a large business until the St. Louis house was compelled to suspend temporarily as a result of a financial panic sweeping the country.

However, very soon Benoist's financial genius enabled him to triumph over his embarrassments. Upon reopening, he was able to pay depositors their due, along with 10% interest for the time during which their funds were tied up. His resumption of banking operations was met with even greater public confidence and esteem. It may truly be said that he was one of the great Western financiers of his generation and a remarkably progressive man in every respect.

Ouestion: In what year was Benoist compelled to temporarily suspend banking operations? If you think you know the answer,
